The program utilizes a life skills curriculum that promotes self-discipline, respect, educational excellence and achievement, as well as personal responsibility and career exposure – all of which leads to a generation of future successful citizens who are committed to giving back to the communities in which they serve.

Developed in 2003, the *Men of Tomorrow* Program addresses the long-term problem of African-American male teenagers who are disproportionately represented in the Juvenile Justice System of Georgia. It also addresses the below average performance of African-American pre-teen and teen males in the classroom and on national standardized tests, such as the SAT and ACT.

"It is critically important to invest in American students, especially in rough economic times. It is more important now than ever to support our nation's most valued resource—our youth, particularly those in high school, who will most immediately inherit our economic problems

His mother, Karen Conley said, "Had he not been in your Mentorship Program, I don't know that he would have acquired his interest in flying." Jarred received his private pilot's certification this year and he is currently a Senior at Tuskegee University with a dual major in Aerospace Engineering and Physics. Jarred will graduate in May, 2010 and plans to become a U.S. Navy Pilot.
